

Although the work that is presented in this paper is very interesting and important for the CO_2 modelling community, I think that the authors selected the wrong journal. A large amount of bookkeeping leads to a detailed map op CO_2 emissions (PKU- CO_2). I have very little questions about the validity of the methods used. However, real scientific innovation is difficult to find. The fact that in developing countries energy use differs widely from city to rural areas is interesting. But the application to biosphere inversions is not new:

This article is not even in the reference list. Simply using Carbontracker and some


